


Forum Theatre is a form where actors present a short prepared play where poor decisions are made and the ending is catastrophic. It is presented twice – the first time beginning to end in the normal fashion. The second time through, anyone in the audience can call 'Stop!', come onto the stage and replace one of the actors, to see if the outcome can be changed. It can be funny, frustrating, enlightening and empowering as an audience collectively discovers how to challenge discriminatory practices and cultures.

The ACT Women's Summit is an invite only event which will bring together key community and government stakeholders for the development of the Second Action Plan 2020-22, under the ACT Women's Plan 2016-26.

Rebus was also successful in two rounds of ArtsACT funding this month! We received a grant through their non-funded organisation capacity building round to develop a fundraising skills and develop philanthropic networks.

We also received funding through their under \$5,000 round to perform Open Doors Open Minds at Meeting Place 2019 in December. Meeting Place is the leading event for arts and disability in Australia, and the only disability-led event of its kind. It brings together local, national and international arts and cultural leaders, arts workers and artists to present, perform, discuss and debate the latest in access and inclusion in the arts.

Bridges or Barricades Wrap Up

Rebus has just wrapped up our second *Bridges or Barricades* program, a tailor made Forum Theatre Program for schools in the ACT region. After running the program in 2017 at Kingsford Smith School, Teaching Artists, Ali Clinch and Sammy Moynihan, have just completed the program at <u>Telopea Park School</u>. The program runs for 10 weeks and tackles issues unique to an individual school's community and culture.

During the program older students work with younger students to find out what kind of experiences they have with conflict in their day to day school lives. They use this information to develop an interactive theatre piece, that is then performed to the younger students, allowing them to work together to find solutions to the challenges they have been facing.

17 year 9/10 Drama Students developed the performance in consultation with 50 year 6/7 students. Some students experienced a vast change in their attitudes to self and their impact in the drama space and the wider school community. Others were quiet achievers but were clearly benefiting from the work demonstrating increase confidence and selfesteem over the course of the program.

The program aims to create a close community within the drama space, encouraging students to develop empathy for others in their class with a special focus on students with whom they wouldn't not normally associate. The group achieved this community nicely, demonstrating care for one another throughout the final stages of the program and during performances.



Public Performance: Access All Areas: Justice



We are well into rehearsal for Access All Areas: Justice and we are already proud of what we are creating. We will be delivering this free professional development opportunity to staff of justice services in the ACT to attend experiential inclusion training that's also fun over October.

To wrap up the project we are also holding a public performance on Friday October 25 from 6pm in the Main Hall at Gorman Arts Centre, 55 Ainslie Ave, Braddon.

This interactive performance is developed and presented by people with disabilities. It will look at where things can go wrong when people with disability (including mental ill-health) interact with justice services, allowing audiences to work together to find solutions.

This training is being presented to all areas of justice services including Police, Lawyers, Public Advocates, Public Servants, Corrections Staff, and Policy Makers.

Rebus has been invited to be part of the program at upcoming disability arts forum Meeting

Place 2019 in December. Meeting Place is the leading event for arts and disability in Australia, and the only disability-led event of its kind. It brings together local, national and international arts and cultural leaders, arts workers and artists to present, perform, discuss and debate the latest in access and inclusion in the arts.

Rebus will take part in workshops and panels and have also applied for a small ArtsACT

grant to perform our Open Doors Open Minds Forum Theatre show at the event. Open Doors Open Minds explores the barriers and frustrations faced by people with disabilities in accessing community programs and services. Set in Community Arts Centre that is running an inclusive program, Open Doors Open Minds explores the technological, systemic and attitudinal barriers to full and meaningful participation of people with disabilities in community activities.



Rebus has submitted an application for ArtsACT Program Funding to deliver Actorvate, a training program for theatre practitioners interested in developing their skills in Community Arts and Cultural Development (CACD) practice. If successful Rebus will be running a twoyear training program for successful applicants, who will be paid a trainee wage as they develop their skills in a range of theatrical techniques that can be applied to CACD practice. As part of the program Rebus will also hold a number of weekend workshops open to the public on a fee for service basis.

Final stages of Community Consultations for 'Access All

Areas: Justice'



We are in the final stages of planning and consultation for this project and begin developing the training in early September. The interest from the justice sector has been overwhelming and we are in discussions with the Australian Federal Police, the Department of Public Prosecutions, The Human Rights Commission, and Legal Aid about organising training sessions for their employees.



Discussing Disgust



Rebus artistic director Robin Davidson partnered with Bradley Foxlewin, a mental health lived experience advocate and psychotherapist, to lead a one day workshop on the experience of disgust in the therapeutic alliance. The workshop was attended by nine people, including professional therapists, people with lived experiences of mental health challenges and others seeking to understand more fully the topic. The workshop drew on Bradley's training in Gestalt psychotherapy, Robin's work in the Theatre of the Oppressed, and his recent training in the pedagogy of movement theatre with Giovanni Fusetti in Italy. One of the many highlights of the workshop, the unpacking of a single moment of a relationship affected by drug use, conducted with participants, was deeply moving and the source of much reflection on the impacts and consequences of disgust.



Meet the Board: Daniel Savage - General Board Member

He brings to the board his extensive knowledge of art and disability, his broad connections within both the contemporary art and disability community, and his passion for developing the skills, reputation and critical discourse of artists with disabilities.

A Tender Thing



This week we began rehearsals for 'A Tender Thing'. The project aims to develop the skills of Canberra theatre artists with a disability (including mental illness), or other forms of disadvantage, as a bridge between recreational or community drama programs and an emerging arts practise. Participants will create an original performance loosely based on Romeo and Juliet: the most famous celebration of romantic love in English-speaking theatre. The script will include text from the original play and writing from the group.

The project is being led by Heidi Silberman, lead tutor in our 'Inclusive Drama with Rebus' classes at The Hub In Phillip, and features participants from the classes, who want to take the next step in their acting careers.

Bridges or Barricades

Rebus is a Canberra based, mixed-ability theatre company that uses the interactive model of Forum Theatre as a community education and training tool around social issues. Rebus is seeking expressions of interest from people with disabilities to participate in a half-day workshop to share stories about challenges they have faced in interacting with justice services in the ACT.

These stories will then be used to develop an inclusion training program for staff from justice services across the ACT. It is important to note that justice services are not limited to criminal justice settings. They may include civil matters or any matters where legal contracts are involved such as employment or housing.

The workshop will consist of various physical activities and exercises as well as discussion, which will be adapted around the requirements of the workshop participants. Join us in this workshop and have your say about how justice services in the ACT can bridge the gap between their accessibility policies and practice.

The workshop will be held on Saturday September 14 from 1pm-5pm at the Griffin Centre, 20 Genge Street, Canberra City. Participants in the workshop will include members of the public with a disability and a cast of four actors who will be performing the scenarios, consisting entirely of people with a disability.

Each workshop participant will receive a \$100 per diem for taking the time to attend. There are limited places available in this workshop.
